## Feminisms & Visual Activisms

How do I actively belong with/in the world? How can I participate in social change? How can WE make our lives 'equally livable' and 'breathable'?

This course explores the relationship between the visual, activism, contemporary culture and feminisms; and how their intersections enable social change. Current Covid-19 pandemic has already reimagined the 1970s feminist adage, 'the personal is political', with a renewed sense of urgency. The world as we knew it is out of balance; it no longer exists and it is no longer possible. How do we act and 'breathe' together to make the world 'equally livable' to all?

The course is taught through a series of: interactive lectures; online social; story circles; reading tasks and collective and collaborative development of readings lists; intensive workshops and *walk*shops; self and peer critical evaluation: reflective journals; independent learning; and personal and peer tutorials.

## Key themes:

- •Feminisms, social justice and human rights with/in visual cultures;
- •The visible and the invisible; ways of seeing and practices of looking;

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- •The right to one's body; embodied actions;
- •Creative practices of resistance and disruption;
- •Feminist interventions in the field of contemporary art, fashion, the public sphere, and cultural production;
- •Activism in relation to broader questions of cultural difference, history, class, economic standing, ecological issues, and sexual orientation; and their intersections.

## Those interested in participation are asked to prepare:

- A portfolio of creative practice or other experience
- A response (up to 250 words) to the following question:
  How does your practice engage with social justice and/ or the exercise of freedom?
